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Overview

Agencies in Missouri are dedicated to improving maternal and infant health outcomes. There are multiple new initiatives that are working to address this important issue.

The Current State of Maternal and Infant Health in Missouri:

From 2018-2020, an average of 70 Missouri women died while pregnant or within one year of pregnancy. Eighty-four percent of pregnancy-related deaths were determined to be preventable.¹

What is Being Done To Improve Maternal and Infant Health in Missouri?

- Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies is a new website with the goal to consolidate education and resources in a single location for mothers and healthcare providers.
- **Twelve month postpartum coverage** for women with MO HealthNet has been approved. "Federal approval of the 12 month postpartum coverage is an important step toward improving health outcomes for moms in the state of Missouri," said Todd Richardson, Director, MO HealthNet. "With nearly fifty percent of births in Missouri on MO HealthNet we want to make sure that mothers have the ability to take care of their own health as well as the health of their babies."
- **Group prenatal visits** will be soon be approved. Kirk Mathews, Chief Transformation officer at MO HealthNet: "We are excited to announce the launch of additional reimbursement to providers conducting evidenced-based group prenatal visits for their patients. We believe this is a great step toward eliminating the racial disparities in maternal/infant health outcomes that have existed far too long." Group prenatal care has demonstrated reduction in preterm birth, neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) admissions; increased birth weight for term and preterm infants; increased rates of breastfeeding initiation and continuation; decreased emergency department visits in the third trimester; improved pregnancy-related weight management; an increase in patients presenting in active labor and at greater cervical dilatation; increased patient, obstetrician and other obstetric care provider satisfaction; and improved knowledge of childbirth, family planning, postpartum depression, and early child rearing.²

Missouri Agencies Launch Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies

JEFFERSON CITY, MO –MO HealthNet, a division of the Missouri Department of Social Services, in collaboration with the Department of Health and Senior Services, Department of Mental Health, and Department of Elementary and Secondary Education is excited to launch the Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies initiative. The mission of Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies is to achieve better health outcomes by connecting women to quality healthcare and supportive resources that will provide healthy, successful pregnancy and post-partum experiences for both mom and baby. According to the <u>Pregnancy-Associated Mortality Review</u>, every year an average of 70 women die while pregnant or within one year of pregnancy in Missouri. 84% of these pregnancy-related deaths were determined to be preventable. The Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies efforts are designed to address not only maternal health concerns, but also pre-term pregnancies, and low birth weight and very low birth weight babies.

"Pregnancy and early motherhood is a very vulnerable time for women," said Todd Richardson, Director, MO HealthNet. "I want to thank all the state agencies, community partners, and healthcare providers that continue to contribute to this initiative. As a group representing many facets of healthcare and early childhood in the state we are striving to think innovatively and comprehensively about how we can support women and families during this critical phase. We will continue to push, but I am proud to launch the Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies initiative as well as the numerous policy changes we have made so far

The <u>Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies website</u> offers a hub of information for women, to support them and their children through their journeys to motherhood, from conception through postpartum. Women can use the website to educate themselves, learn about obtaining healthcare coverage, and find resources to provide a safe and healthy environment for their babies. The Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies initiative supports a number of policy changes that have been implemented by MO HealthNet to improve maternal and infant health outcomes. The federal government recently approved Missouri's implementation of extended post-partum coverage for women enrolled in MO HealthNet. This new policy will provide 12 months of coverage to moms after the end of their pregnancy. Providers and community partners can find additional information including a toolkit of promotional materials regarding MO HealthNet pregnancy coverage on the <u>Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies website</u>.

MO HealthNet has also identified opportunities to cover additional services and benefits that support women through their pregnancy. MO HealthNet is partnering with St. Louis Integrated Health Network to launch group prenatal care across Missouri. Group prenatal care models are designed to improve patient education and include opportunities for social support while maintaining the risk screening and physical assessment of individual prenatal care. MO HealthNet has also approved the Missouri's managed care providers to cover doula services where available.

Todd Richardson, Director, MO HealthNet said, "With nearly fifty percent of births in Missouri on MO HealthNet we want to make sure that mothers have the ability to take care of their own health as well as the health of their babies."

This extension of postpartum benefits for women with MO HealthNet coverage was passed in 2023 by the Missouri Legislature and signed into law by Governor Parson.

Q: I am pregnant and I have MO HealthNet, what should I do?

A: It is important that we know you are pregnant so we can make sure to cover your services. You need to report your pregnancy as soon as possible. You can report your pregnancy in one of these ways:

Pregnancy FAQ - health insurance

Q: I don't have health insurance and I'm pregnant, what should I do?

A: Getting regular healthcare is vital for you and your baby's health and to make sure there are no problems. If you do not currently have healthcare coverage, you can apply for MO HealthNet for Pregnant Women, which is part of MO HealthNet (Missouri Medicaid), in one of the following ways:

•Online through our **online portal** •In person at your local FSD Resource Center NOTE: You do not need to provide a doctor's note or positive pregnancy test to qualify for MO HealthNet for Pregnant Women. If you want to learn more about applying for MO HealthNet you can visit:

Pregnancy FAQ - Breast Pump

Q: Can MO HealthNet help cover the cost of a breast pump?

A: If you are a MO HealthNet Managed Care member, breast pumps are provided to you through your health plan. For Fee-For-Service participants, breast pumps are covered up to the age of 21.

If you have MO HealthNet insurance, you will be covered for a full 12 months after the end of your pregnancy.


Q: Will MO HealthNet cover midwife services?

A: Yes. MO HealthNet will cover services provided by a Certified Nurse Midwife that accepts MO HealthNet insurance.

If you have MO HealthNet insurance, you will be covered for a full 12 months after the end of your pregnancy.

Pregnancy FAQ - health coverage after delivery

Q: Will MO HealthNet still cover me after I delivery my baby?

A: Yes. Women with MO Healthnet receive healthcare coverage for themselves and baby up to 12 months after the date of delivery

If you have MO HealthNet insurance, you will be covered for a full 12 months after the end of your pregnancy.
